






Greetings, Central North District,



UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH ANDREWS CHAPEL UNITED METHODIST CHURCH JONESBORO, GEORGIA 2023 PROJECT FOR CLAYTON COUNTY SCHOOLS

The United Women in Faith (UWF) of Andrews Chapel United Methodist Church (ACUMC) launched the **UWF 2023 Schools' Project** in two phases designed to support students in seven schools in Clayton County, GA. Dr. Connie Ward, UWF Vice President/Program Committee Chair, along with the support of Dierdra Raines, Secretary of Programs, spearheaded the project.

In Phase I, the issue of **Period Poverty** was tackled by donating funds and pouches for essential female products for girls. In Phase II, the focus was addressing the national **"Stop the School to Prison Pipeline Priority**" by providing hygiene products to schools for girls and boys. According to Dr. Ward, the primary objective of these two phases was to build strong relationships with the leadership and staff of each school. Simultaneously, the aim was to ease the financial burden on teachers and other staff by supplying personal and essential products that students need daily. Too often, educators serving students in poor communities have to dip into their own pockets to cover the costs of these basic items for their students. Educators and UWF members also understand that a lack of these essential products in the homes and schools of students can significantly impact their self-esteem.

Most of the participating schools are historically significant to the church's congregation because they are named for prominent black citizens with lasting legacies in Clayton County. The names of the seven schools are Kay R. Pace Elementary School, J. W. Arnold Elementary School, James Jackson Elementary School, Lillie E Suder Elementary School, Lee Street Elementary School, M. D. Roberts Middle School and Jonesboro Middle School.

The UWF unit and individual members purchased, assembled and delivered products to each school. Special gratitude was extended to these UWF members for ensuring that each school received its designated funds and pouches in each phase: Dr. Connie Ward, Cornelius Smith, Dorothy Murphy, Dierdra Raines, Dorothy Davidson-Owens, and Georgia Wilson.

Phase I - Period Poverty



Period poverty is defined as a lack of access to menstrual products due to financial restraints. We discovered from research that "Period Poverty" was affecting young girls in the United States and in our church community as well. Some girls stay home from school because they can't afford menstrual products and/or they are uncomfortable

revealing the need to school personnel. The ACUMC UWF unit envisioned reducing the burdens of period poverty in the seven schools selected by donating menstrual items plus \$50 per school to purchase additional feminine hygiene products. Ziplocked pouches were also provided so that the products could be discretely given to the students. We recognized that

poor hygiene could lead to young girls being teased and misbehaving in school and could potentially contribute to disciplinary issues. Being able to afford menstrual products is vital to the physical and mental health of students. We are pleased to report that in May 2023, the ACUMC UWF unit donated \$350 and delivered 300 pouches to these schools.

Phase II – Stop the School to Prison Pipeline



A national priority of the United Women in Faith is to interrupt the school to prison pipeline for the well-being of children and youth and to ensure racial equity in our schools. Some students are disciplined because of their reactions to teasing and critical comments about their lack of hygiene from other students and/or adults. In

some cases the severity of the reactions leads to suspensions, expulsions and/or the involvement of law enforcement officers. The School to Prison Pipeline is often fueled by strict zero-tolerance policies, that mandate severe consequences for minor rule violations. This overuse of frequent suspensions and/or expulsions, especially for minority students, can hinder students' educational progress and cause them to drop out of school. Far too many of these students find themselves involved in the juvenile justice system which increases the risk of future criminality.

Our unit saw another opportunity to have a positive impact on our targeted schools by providing hygiene products for girls and boys. Giving the schools hygiene products that the teachers/parents don't have to buy might lessen misbehaviors caused by teasing and embarrassment over not having socks and other hygienic products. In this small way we are trying to close the door to the criminal justice system for students in our community. In September 2023, we filled and delivered 425 personal hygiene pouches to the schools. Each pouch in Phase II contained two varieties of hand sanitizer, lotion, toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, tissues, and deodorant. Additionally, we also provided extra items in bulk, such as sanitizing cloths, toothbrushes, toothpaste, large hand soaps, hand sanitizers, and socks.

We would like to express our sincere appreciation to sponsors from our church and the larger community for their invaluable support. We also want to acknowledge our dedicated volunteers, including those who took on multiple roles, contributing their time and support to the ACUMC UWF 2023 Clayton County Schools Project.

This project will have a lasting impact on the students and schools involved. The administration and staff were deeply touched by the caring commitment of the UWF unit of ACUMC, and expressed their gratitude for our efforts in raising funds and supplying essential products for their students. The students felt a sense of value and good fortune that individuals in the local community were willing and able to address their personal needs and circumstances. The seven schools have a combined enrollment of 4,507 students, so there is still much to be done. The ACUMC UWF plans to grow its relationship with these schools and will solicit involvement of other ministries and groups in the church and external community for future projects. "It takes a village!".

St. James Alpharetta Shares "Love in Action" in New Ways This Fall

UWF of St. James consistently finds new ways to spread "Love in Action" in our community and among our church members.

One of our special mission opportunities is to share the love of Christ with Manning Oaks Elementary School here in Alpharetta. GA. We were presented the opportunity to address some very special needs of the young students as voiced by their caring school administrators. This school was extremely grateful to receive our donation of clothing in multiple

sizes, including pants, undergarments and shoes, for those "accidents" and emergency situations that often plague young students. This school is especially near and dear to St. James, as our history reveals that we were blessed to hold Sunday service in the school lunch room at a period in time when we outgrew our existing church building. We now find many ways to give back to Manning Oaks.

Annually, our membership participates in a churchwide Daniel Fast to draw closer to God through fervent, focused prayer and fasting. 

A candymaker in Indiana wanted to make a candy that would be a witness, so he made the Christmas Candy Cane. He incorporated several symbols from the birth, ministry, and death of Jesus Christ.

He began with a stick of pure white, hard candy: white to symbolize the Virgin Birth and the sinless nature of Jesus, and hard to symbolize the Solid Rock, the foundation of the Church, and firmness of the promises of God.



The candymaker made the candy in the form of a "J" to represent the precious name of Jesus, who came to earth as our Savior. It could also represent the staff of the "Good Shepherd" with which He reaches down into the ditches of the world to lift out the fallen lambs who, like all sheep, have gone astray.

Thinking that the candy was somewhat plain, the candymaker stained it with red stripes. He used three small stripes to show the stripes of the scourging Jesus received by which we are healed. The large red stripe was for the blood shed by Christ on the cross so that we could have the promise of eternal life.

Unfortunately, the candy became known as a candy cane — a meaningless decoration seen at Christmas time. But the meaning is still there for those who "have eyes to see and ears to hear." Every time you see a candy cane, remember the Wonder of Jesus and His Great Love that came down at Christmas, and that His Love remains the ultimate and dominant force in the universe today.
